WORDS OF WISDOM FROM RABBI KUSHNER

Homesickness is Incurable

I recently drove past my childhood home again. I don't go out of my way to drive down that street, but when I occasionally do, I always say "hi, house, here I am again!" as if the house was a person to whom I could speak. I often imagine myself, growing up within these walls, looking out at the world from such small windows. I remember the rooms, sounds, smells, and staircases that I could even now trace by heart in the dark, from the vaulted attic to the immense cellar. Of course, when I see the house now, I also note the inevitable changes and additions that have been made to the structure. I mourn the loss of trees and the large vegetable garden. My first cat, Tabby, chose to recluse and die under the spacious leaves of a rhubarb patch, now covered with a cement sidewalk.

Several times in the past years I jogged past the old house and spent a few minutes in the alley contemplating the truncated garden and pondering the now non-existent garage and shed. "Are you looking for anyone?" someone asked me more than once. "No," I responded, "allow me a few moments of nostalgia. I grew up in this house." "Do you want to come in and see it again?" was the question.

I paused, then closed my eyes, seeing the house the way it had been. "Thank you, but I think I need to remember it the way it was."

Sometimes I think of the account of our father Jacob who pillowed his head on a stone and had a dream vision of a ladder with angels ascending and descending. When he awoke, he realized: "God was in this place and I, I did not know." My namesake Rabbi Lawrence Kushner wrote: "It is not Jacob who says, 'God was in this place and I; I did not know.' It is you who are reading these words. You are the sacred text itself. The holy text is not about you. You are not even 'in' it. You are it."

My childhood house and myself have long since merged into one field of memory. I don't crave to go back inside the building to be there. What that house has taught me from my childhood, I carry within me. I don't need the physical walls.

It's comforting to look in the rearview mirror, but you can't drive with your gaze fixed upon it. You need to look at the road that is ahead of you.
